### The Colorblind Framework → Naming Race

° Colorblind-ness: "I don't see color/race, I see people."

- ° This is rooted in good intentions, but is at odds with reality
- Kids notice race and not talking about can create questions and confusion that kids feel they can't
  discuss with the most trusted people in their lives
- ° Skin color is a physical characteristic like hair color, eye color, etc.
- Talking about or observing race/skin color does not make you a racist or reinforces racism
  When a judgement or assumption is assigned to this observation, that we get into the territory
  - Value or Devaluing tied to skin color


# Strategies for talking about racism

#### **Interpersonal Racism**

- Acknowledge & take care of the feelings of the child who experienced this
- Talk about being a good friend, being kind, etc.
- ° But, also address & unpack the stereotype
- Ex: You can't be a princess/superhero/smart kid because you are X....

#### Institutional Racism


- What happens when kids ask tough questions about history or current events?
- Discuss
- ° The Basic Facts (as you know them)\*
- Age Appropriate
  - Give reassurance or hope (if appropriate)
- ° Share the truth as you understand it
- \*If you don't know, you can explore together or learn more yourself and revisit when you feel comfortable
